Latest News from Congo

So far, there have been 18 deaths from Covid-19 in Kinshasa which has now been locked down to prevent the spread to other provinces. Although there are no known cases in Lubumbashi, the governor has taken several preventative measures, including shutting down schools, bars, restaurants and places of worship. Confinement only lasted two days as 98% of the population live from day to day and have neither money nor food to spare. The spread of the virus would be a disaster as the

country has been struggling to deal with the world's worst measles outbreak. Since January 2019, 6,300 children have died from it. Malaria also hit the people badly last year. Fortunately all of the children at the school have been vaccinated against measles and as soon as there are any signs of malaria, the medical centre is just next door

caring for the children, staff and the local community. We took \$1000 last June when we met with the sisters in Zambia and they bought two solar panels and batteries to provide constant power.

The sisters have met with an official from the land registry and after much negotiation will be able to purchase an area 40m by 15m for \$10,000 as land is now so expensive in the outskirts of Lubumbashi.
