Dear Friends,

We are trying out a new format for the newsletter and if we can fit all the news in, we'll use it from now on. There is plenty to celebrate in this edition and the sisters and teachers at the school are extremely grateful for all our contributions. Sponsorship continues to be our main source of donations (now £120 per year). In 2020, the government made it illegal for schools to demand parental contributions for primary schooling. However, no decent schools seem to be built and few of the teachers are paid as schools become increasingly overcrowded. This has led to strikes in most schools recently as they have lost their main source of income which was parents' financial contributions. Fortunately, our donations keep the School for Peace flourishing in a country where 7.6 million children aged 5 -17 are still out of school. \*

### Secondary school information

Good news about the sixth form leavers: out of 38 pupils in the four sections (General Education, Literary, Scientific, Business), 37 of them passed the state exam in the summer. The results from the rest of the secondary school are good, too, including those of our sponsored young people.

### Primary school information

We have received the results of the sponsored children's summer exams and the results range from 38.6% to 86.8%. Only three children have left to move to another area with their families.

### University students

We are proud of Pichuna and Joseph, however there are still five other sponsored students in Higher Education who are finishing their studies. We are grateful to all their sponsors as the cost of sponsoring them - academic fees plus registration and related costs - amounts to \$600 (£465) per year.

- Friends have also been raising money both in France (a 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary) and at home (an 80<sup>th</sup> birthday party) as well as making jam, knitting and running stalls. We are really grateful for all the hard work these events have involved.

## MONEY SENT IN 2023-2024

This year we have sent enough money to pay for teachers' essential resources such as stationery and textbooks; more reading material for the school library has been purchased and they have repaired things which were broken. The long-awaited new photocopier has arrived which Sister Marie-Salomé, her colleagues and pupils called a beautiful gift with which they are delighted.

### The flooding in Kalémie, capital of Tanganyika Province

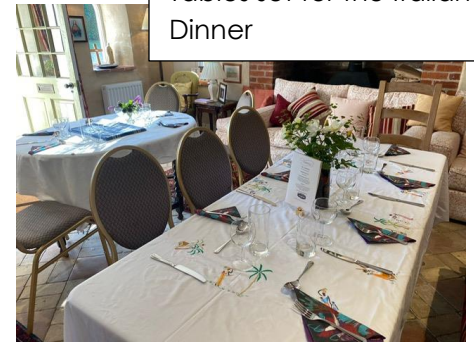
This is where the sisters' Mother House is situated. Sister Virginie wrote that there was unprecedented flooding in the town and we have seen video footage of this calamity. The waters of Lake Tanganyika have dropped a little but many houses and surrounding fields have been destroyed and the current is still strong. She also explained that it has been hotter than ever this year with little rain so that the corn (staple grain) is not growing. This could mean famine for many in the coming months.
